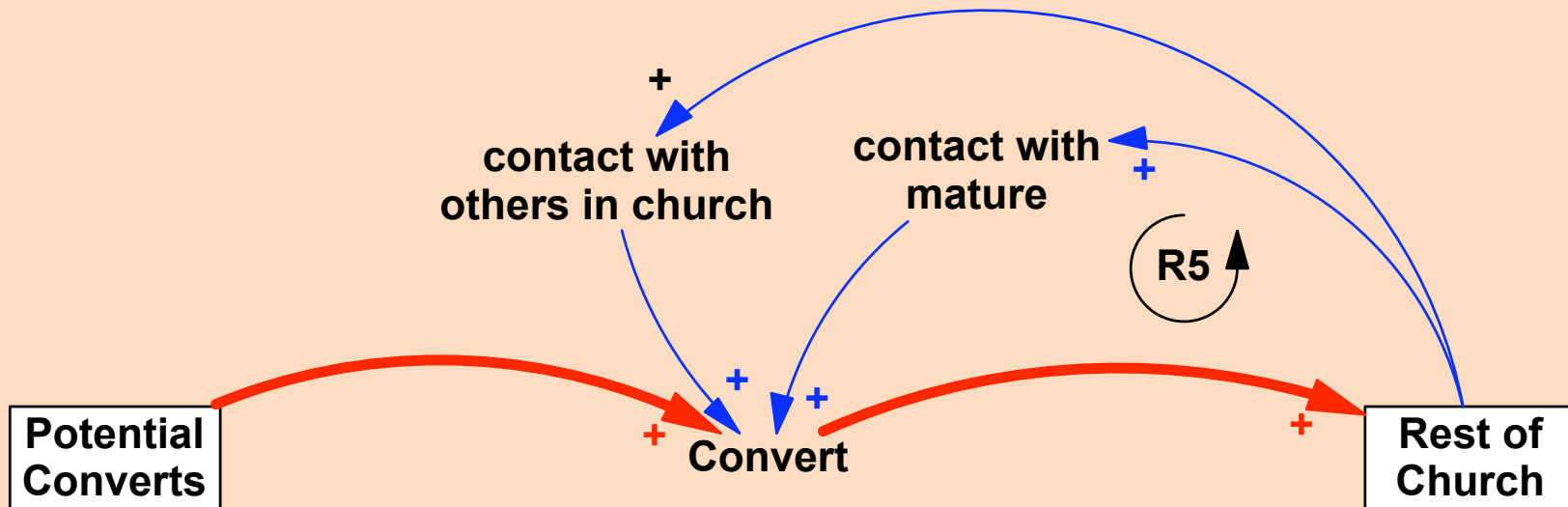

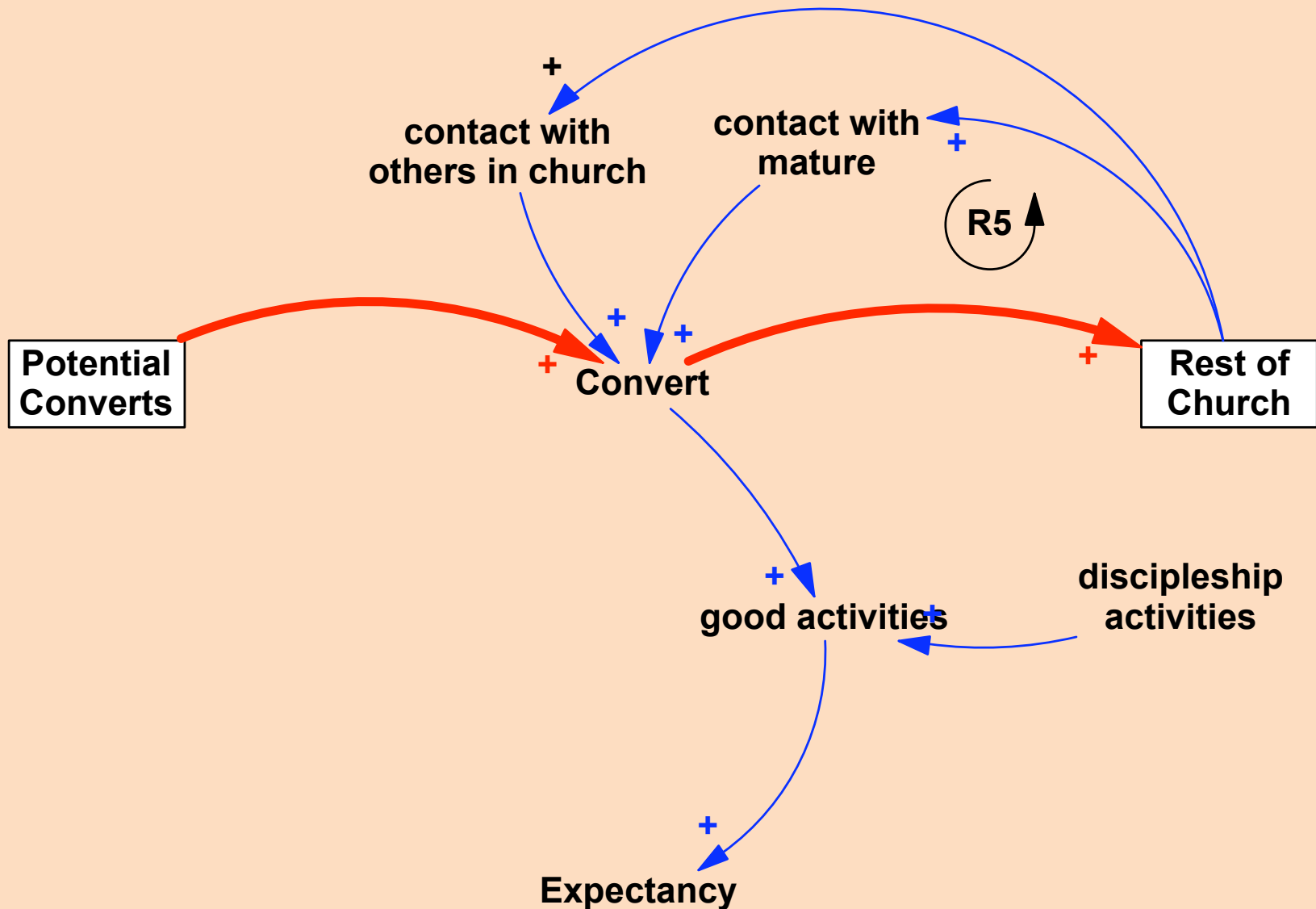

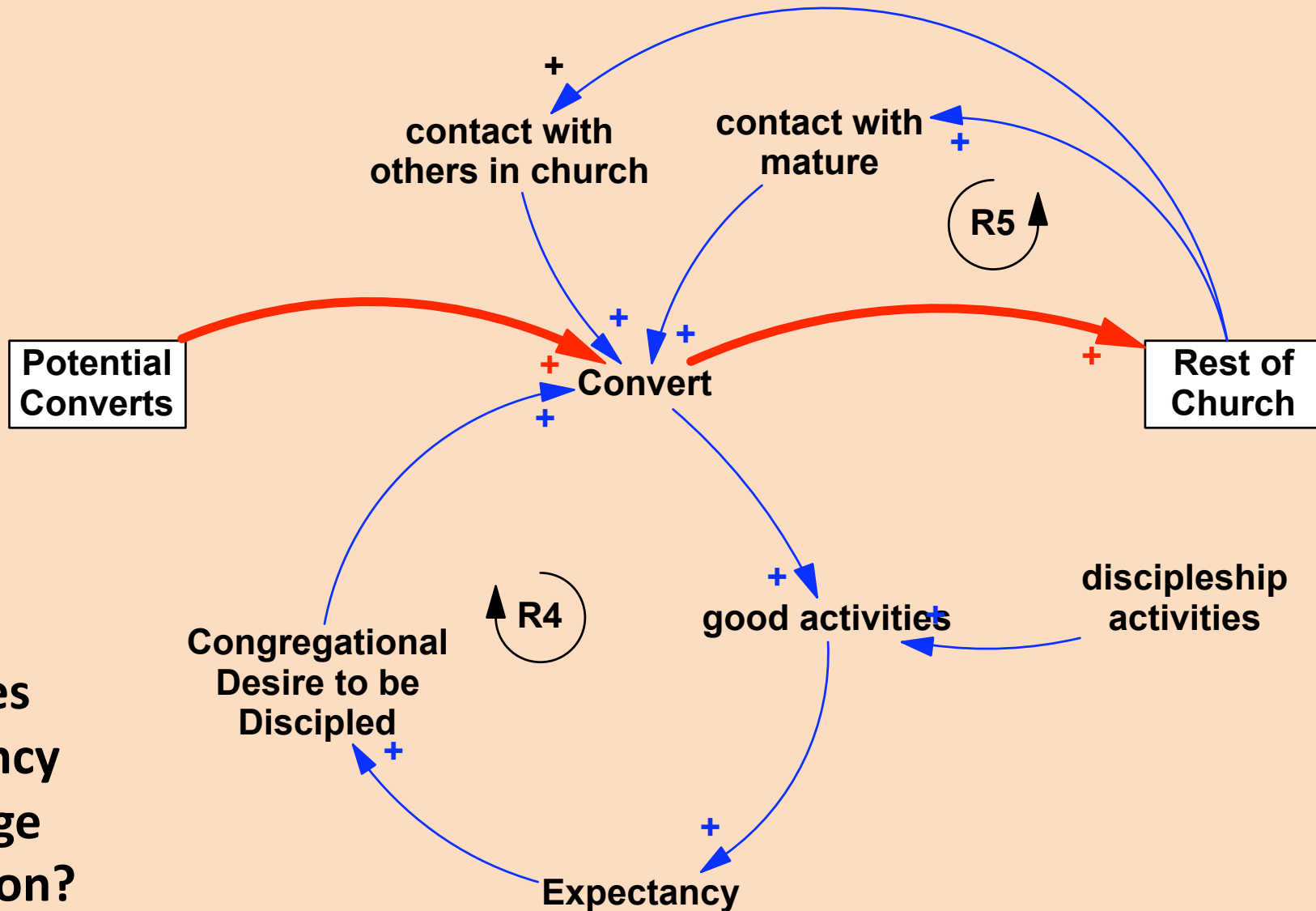

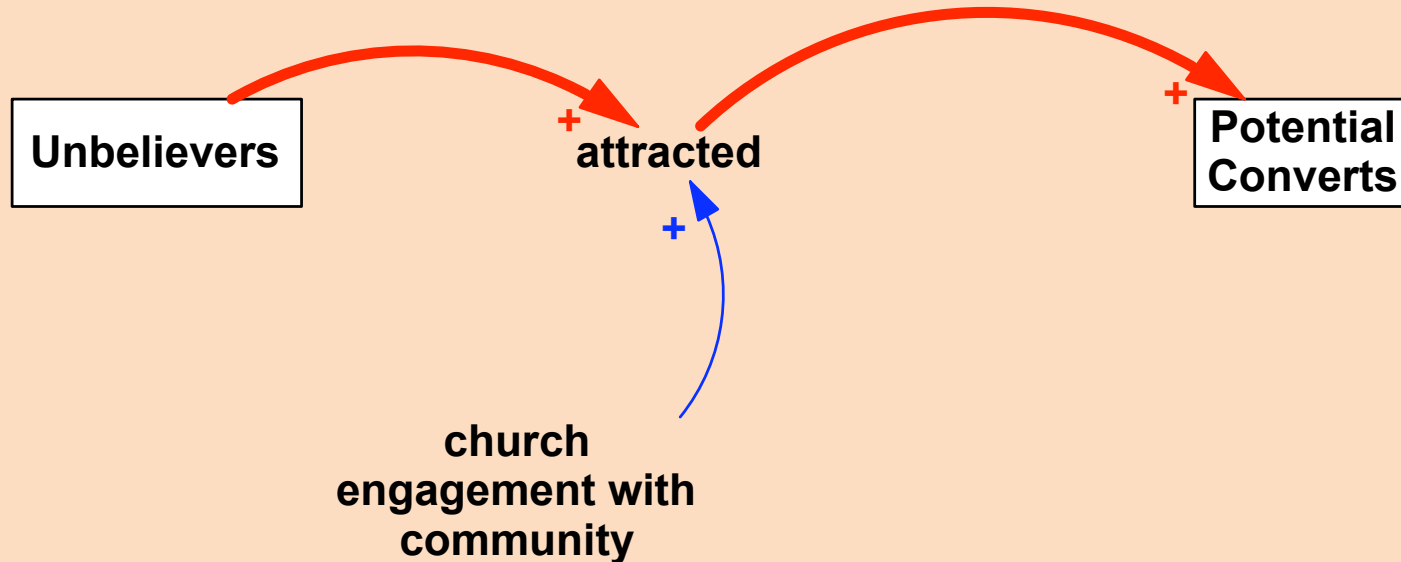

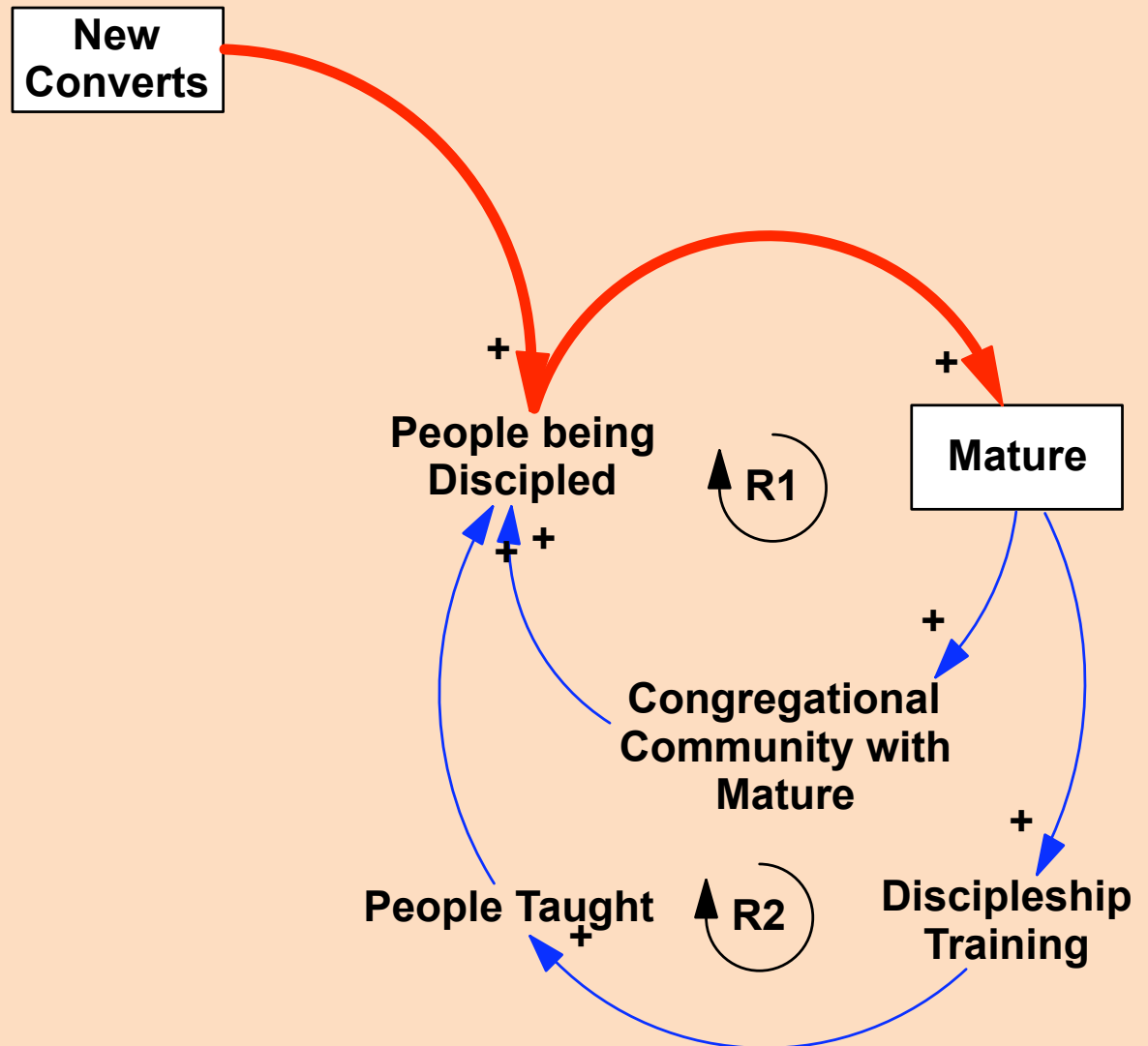

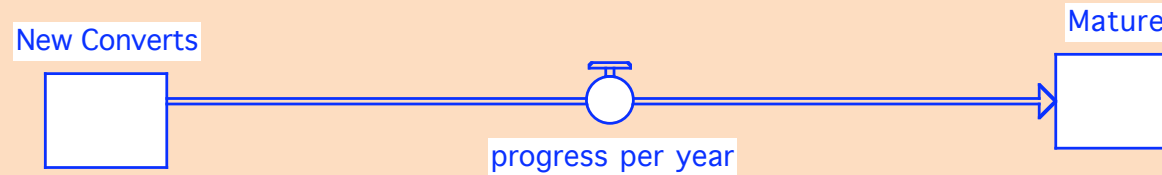
Demand

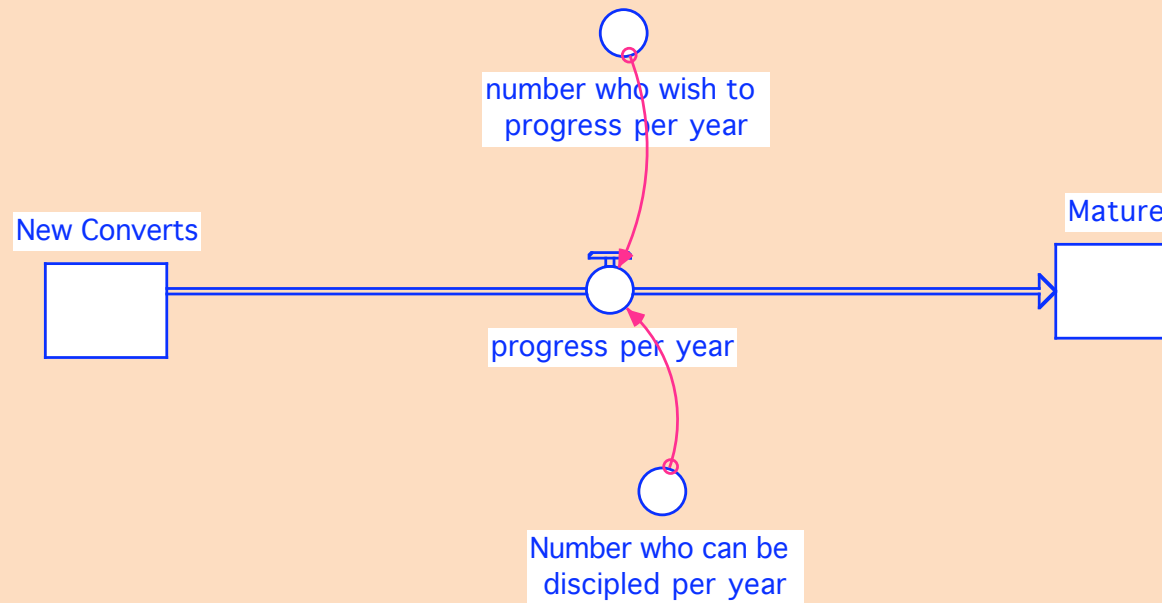

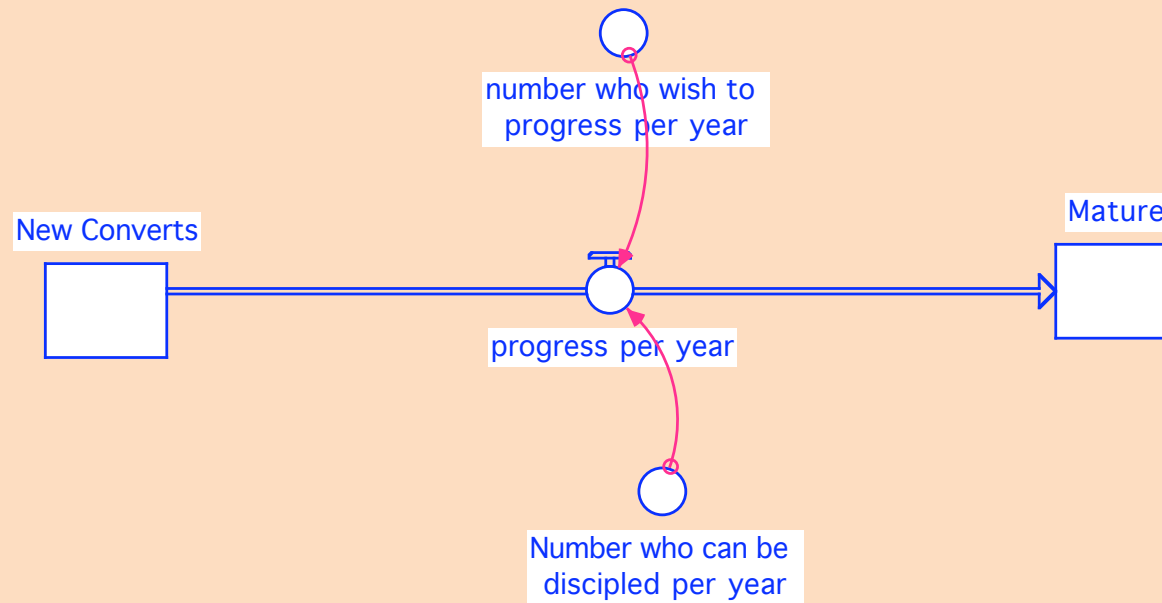

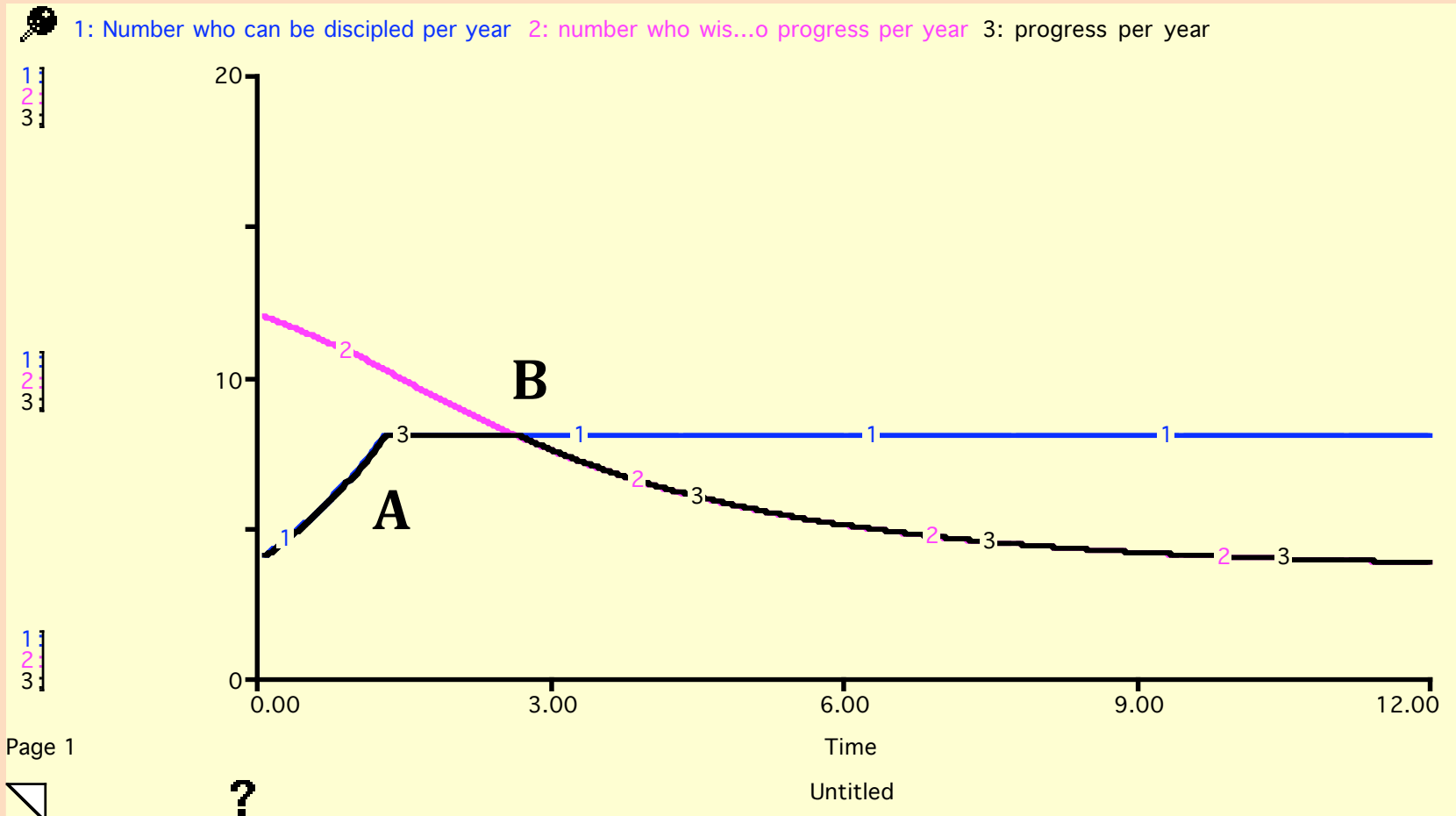

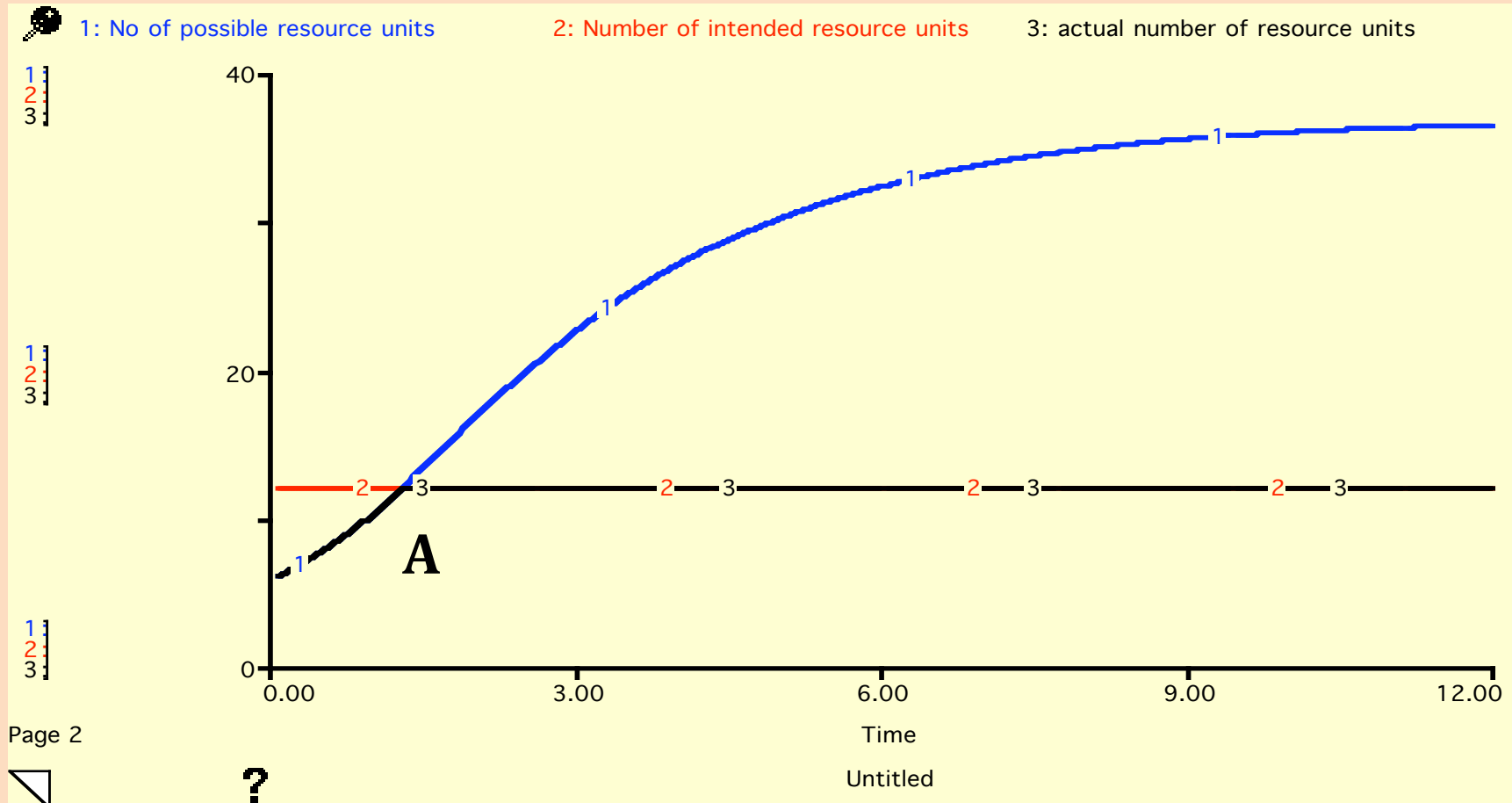

Expectancy

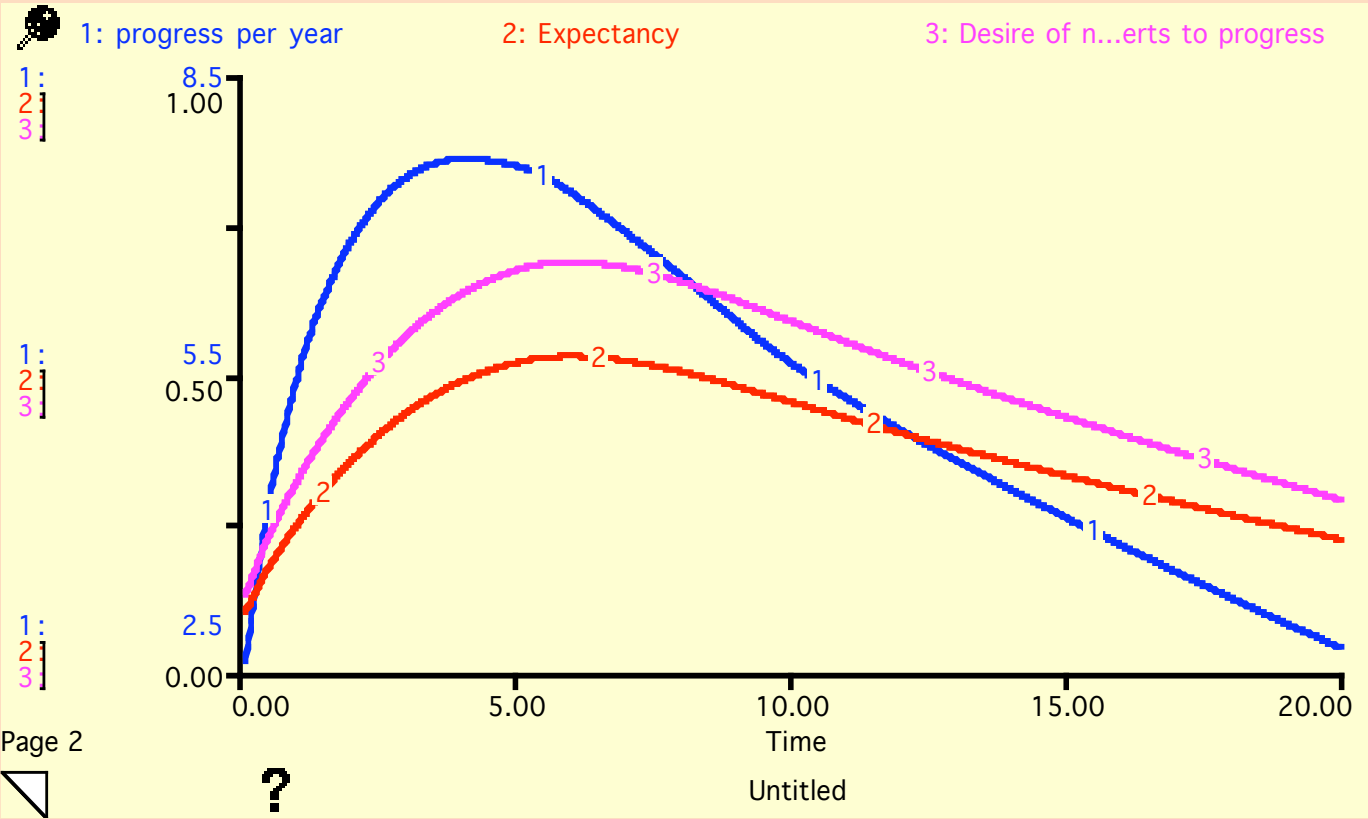


1. When spiritual activity, conversions etc start happening in church, does expectancy rise immediately?

4. Can leaders raise expectancy, even when there is no spiritual activity taking place (and vice versa)?

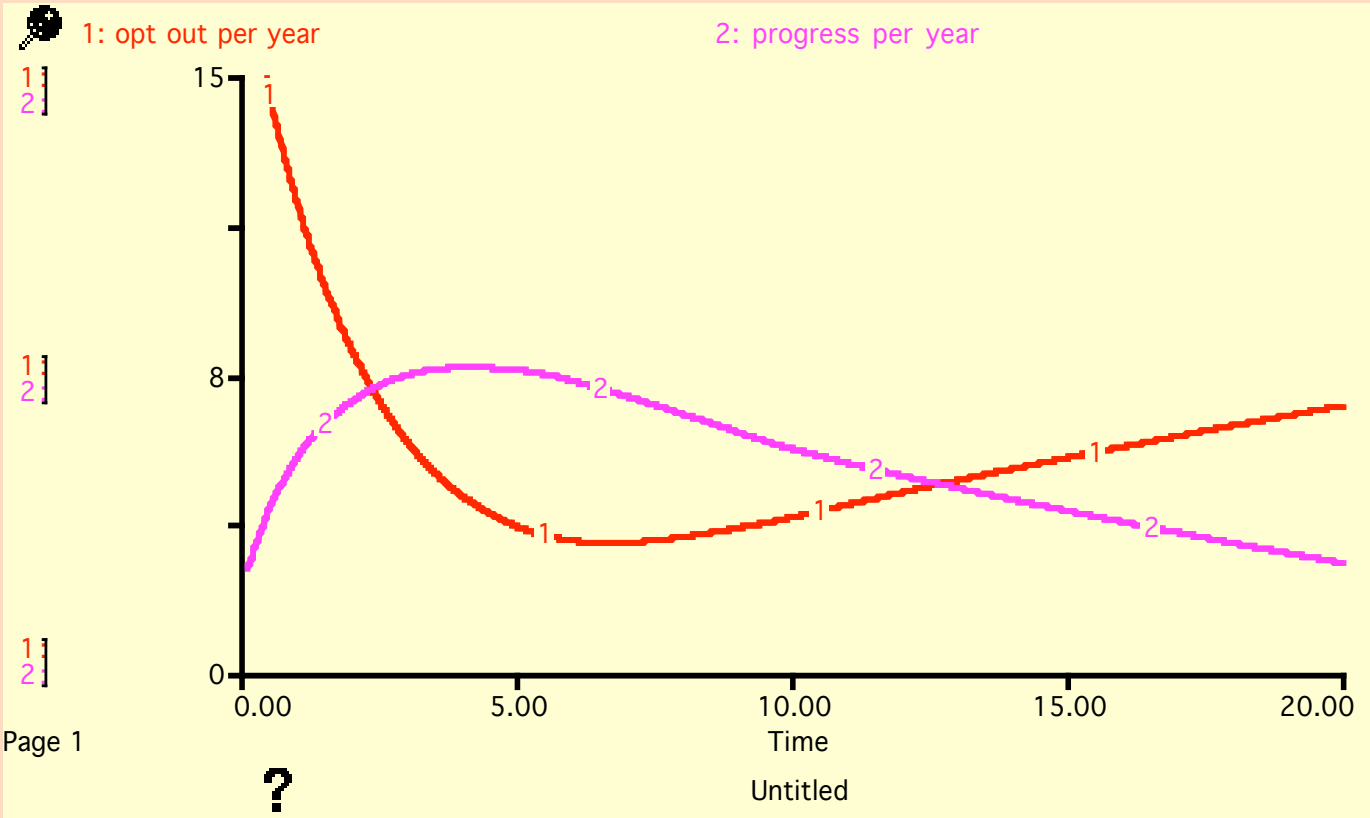
